HOMES IN DEMAND

Needs of the Hour Are Several Hundred Modern Homes.

As has been anticipated, there has been a large movement in residence property during the past few days and the demand is a growing one. Lots in the village of Breitung, sold by Minnear & Co., are finding a ready sale and several have already changed hands at an increase in price. A new sub-division, handled by Cruse & co., has been named "Ferndale." A portion of the Corollo [*sic – Carollo*] farm has been platted by the firm. These lots are well located for homes for industrial workers, being within walking distance of the Ford plants, close to the von Platen-fox mill and convenient to all the railroads. Lots in the Victoria Park addition, handled by M.E. Richards for the Iron Mountain Land & Mineral company, are being sold rapidly. There are no finer residence lots in the district. A newly incorporated concern – the Iron Mountain Real Estate company – will plat several hundred acres in the immediate future. The lands are to the north, south and west of the Ford industries – some has [*sic – have*] a river frontage. One desirable tract is located in the vicinity of Crystal Lake, where the Ford folks are going to locate their recreation park and play grounds [*sic – playgrounds*]. This land is

well-wooden [*sic – well-wooded*] and a special effort will be made to preserve all the natural beauty.

Business property is moving slowly. The only considerable deal reported recently was the purchase by E.J. DeGayner of the property at the corner of West B street and Carpenter avenue, occupied as a garage. The consideration, we understand, was \$10,000. Many deals are pending, but the seller and buyer appear to be unable to get to-gether [*sic – together*]. And, too, buyers are hesitating for the reason that they are unable to reach a decision as to the future business center of the city.

The need of the hour is a company to erect homes. To-day [*sic – Today*] there is a sale for several hundred modern residences. The company that will plat a tract of land, erect homes on the lots and make street improvements will reap a substantial profit in a few months. The plans of the Ford company is not to build houses, but unless private capital embraces the opportunity, the company will be forced to erect several hundred in order to house its men.

FIRST DIORITE HOUSE ARRIVES BY TRUCK

Three Trips Necessary to Bring Home to Iron Mountain

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Victor Ameen, Ishpeming transfer man[,] has completed the hauling of the first house to be moved from Diorite to Iron Mountain, where it is being set up on West A street. Eighteen houses at Diorite, owned by R.P. Bronson and associates, will be taken down in sections and moved by automobile trucks to Iron Mountain, where they will be erected.

In moving the first of the houses Mr. Ameen was able to get it to Iron Mountain by three trips with his truck. As the house was taken down in sections it was an easy matter to load th *[sic – the]* truck heavily and it was fourteen and sixteen tons in the three trips.

Otto Koekinen, Diorite contractor, has been awarded a contract to take down and set up the eighteen dwellings. After getting the first house down, he moved his crew to Iron Mountain, but as soon as he completes the present work he will have two crews on the job[,] one working at Diorite taking the houses apart, and the other at Iron Mountain putting them up.

Mr. Ameen was able to make one round trip a day between Diorite and Iron Mountain, the journey requiring about nine hours each way. Everything in the house by the plaster was moved and as the basement and foundation had already been constructed at the new location at Iron Mountain the carpenters were able to start setting the house up as soon as it was unloaded.

*“[sic]*It is expected that it will require about five months to complete the moving of all the houses and when the work is resumed Mr. Ameen expects to be occupied night and day with his truck. He will carry mattresses and blankets and his crew will then take turns sleeping enroute *[sic – en route]*.

The moving of the first house is in the nature of an experiment according to J.A.

Payant & Company, which is interested in the deal. The house has five rooms.

SACKIM RESIDENCE

Badly Damaged by Fire at 10:30 Last Night.

THE FAMILY'S MIRACULOUS ESCAPE.

Rescued While Sound Asleep – Timely Discovery of the Fire – Benjamin Simansky Painfully Burned – Good Work by the Firemen.

The residence of **Abe Sackim**, corner of East B and Iron Mountain streets, took fire last night at 10:30 o'clock and the family had a miraculous escape from death.

The family consists of **Mr. and Mrs. Sackim**, three nephews, **Moses Warshawsky**, **David Lewis** and **Benjamin Simansky**, and a domestic. All had retired for the night except Benjamin Simansky, who had remained up later than usual reading. He concluded to retire also at the above named hour, but before doing so stepped into the kitchen to get a drink of water. When he returned to the sitting room he found it all ablaze. Thinking that he could master the flames without aid he

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rushed to one of the large windows on the east side of the house and broke the glass and attempted to throw the blazing curtains and couch out the the *[sic]* window. The fire was too fierce, however, and he then rushed up stairs *[sic – upstairs]* to arouse the remainder of the family.

In the meantime Mr. Sackim was awakened by the noise made by his nephew in trying to subdue the flames and he and his wife hastily got up. Their room was directly over the room that was on fire, and Mrs. Sackim, becoming alarmed at the noise, rushed to the window and threw it open, when the flames, which were pouring out of the windows below, shot up in front of her. Their room was fast filling with a dense smoke and their thoughts went at once to the other members of the family. With difficulty they were aroused, the two boys, Warshawsky and Lewis, being dragged from their bed on the same floor. The domestic, who was asleep in the front room up stairs *[sic - upstairs]*, was also aroused and all made their escape down the front stairs in their night clothes and bare feet, and took refuge in Mrs. Langran's house, next door.

An alarm had been sounded from box 16, Corner of East B and Washington street, and the department promptly responded. Two lines of hose was *[sic – were]* laid and in a short time the fire was extinguished, but the house was badly damaged, especially the downstairs part, which was badly gutted.

Mr. and Mrs. Sackim went to Mr. M. Levy's for the night and Mrs. Henry Smith, a neighbor, took care of the rest of the family. Clothing was hastily procured, as they suffered extremely from the cold, having walked on the snow in their bare feet while seeking shelter. A number of overcoats belonging to the male members of the

family were lying on the couch in the sitting room and were destroyed.

Mr. Sackim thinks the fire originated from the electric wires, as the room in which the fire started contains several of them, and his nephew says he first noticed that the ceiling was on fire along where the wires run, and he can account for the fire starting up so suddenly from no other cause. Mr. Sackim estimates his loss at \$600 on the building and \$700 on his household goods and clothing. A quantity of bric-a-brac was destroyed, some of it being rare specimens of chinaware collected by Mrs. Sackim, which was highly prized and will be hard to replace. The loss to both the house and contents is fully covered by insurance.

Friends of the family are congratulating them on their narrow escape from death, for a moment longer it would have been impossible to have escaped by the stairs and the probability is that those who were up stairs *[sic – upstairs]* would have perished. Benny Simansky is painfully burned about the hands in his efforts to put out the fire.

Too much credit cannot be given the firemen for their services. They responded to the alarm promptly and their work in putting out the flames with as little water as possible showed good judgment and skill.
