## SONG OF THE LAKES

Meet *Song of the Lakes*. A band that's not afraid to show emotion, as they belt out sea shanties, seduce you with a sultry Brazilian melody, or break your heart with a bittersweet ballad. The band made itself a name with sea shanties and Irish melodies in the early 1980s, but its range has widened enormously in the 25-year span they have been together.

*Song of the Lakes* will perform in concert at Northern Michigan University's Forest Roberts Theatre **Thursday August 14 at 7:30 p.m.** Tickets are on sale now at PWPL for \$10.00 for reserved seating.

*Song of the Lakes* will also present *Paddle-to-the-Sea*, a performance for children, Friday July 15 at 1:00 p.m. in the PWPL Community Room. This musical, based on the classic story of *Paddle-to-the-Sea* by Holling Clancy Holling, depicts the travel and adventures of "Paddle", carved by an Ojibwa boy in the north country above Lake Superior, put into the waters, and carried by the currents of the Great Lakes into the salty Ocean. There is no charge for admission for this performance.

*Song of the Lakes* has delved into acoustic rock,



Latin, jazz, and what they call Great Lakes World Music. No matter what you decide to call the band's music, you'll love the revival quality that runs through all the songs. When they say, "25 Years of Joy," they mean it from the depths of their deep blue hearts.

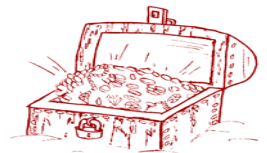
## Awards and Prizes

**Excerpt from *The Honorable Peter White*: by Ralph D. Williams, 1907:**

“The Peter White punch is a famous concoction. A great open air reception was once held for distinguished company at the Peter White home, the rooms being opened so that guests freely passed through the house from the front lawn to the rear lawn. On the porch steps leading to the rear lawn were huge receptacles, filled with Peter White punch, while the punch glasses were suspended from the porch vines. Each guest helped himself in his discretion, some possibly more than others, one of the guests who was something of an artist and a poet as well, later designing the pen and ink sketch reproduced herewith.”

# In Memoriam: Dorothy Boyer

1910-2008

The Peter White Public Library lost a dear friend and ardent supporter when Dorothy Boyer passed away on February 13, 2008 at the age of 97. Dorothy was diminutive in size, but made up for that with a ferocious spirit. She was a fixture in Marquette—seen at her bridge club, local events, St. Peter Cathedral and the Peter White Public Library on a regular basis.

In addition to her strong and abiding faith she was dedicated to her friends, family and the residents of Marquette. She gave generously to support St. Peter Cathedral, St. Vincent DePaul and of course, PWPL.

Dorothy was proud of the beautiful stained glass window she sponsored in the Dandelion Cottage Room of the renovated and expanded PWPL. The window reflects Dorothy in many ways. On bright and sunny days it flows forth with a raucous rainbow of color. Dorothy had a quick, but dry wit, that amused anyone she knew. She could offer a snappy retort to just about any comment or joke. Her friends and family knew that Dorothy was going to get the best of them when it came to verbal jousting.

On cloudy days the window is more contemplative, but soothing, just like Dorothy was. Her determination and quiet strength helped many people to see that tomorrow would be a better day. Dorothy fought tenaciously for the underdog. Her years in the social services field left a positive mark on the community as well as on her colleagues and the clients they served. If you needed help, it was a comfort to know Dorothy was on your side.

Like our community, the Peter White Public Library benefited each time Dorothy visited to read the Ironwood Daily Globe or to chat with staff members. When you sit in the library reading a newspaper or visit the Dandelion Cottage Room and see Dorothy's window, say a silent thanks that such a generous person was a part of our community for so many years. ~



## Peter White's Punch

From *The Honorable Peter White*

3 doz. good lemons - cut in middle, squeezed into receptacle skins and all  
1 qt. Jamaica Rum  
1 qt. Santa Cruz Rum  
1 qt. Brandy  
2 qts. Champagne  
1 bottle Curocoa  
1 bottle Chartruse  
1 bottle Maraschino  
A piece of ice, 8 in. square set in middle of punch bowl.

If made two or three hours before serving, it will improve.

One hour before serving the punch, put in one quart of strong cold English breakfast tea and five lbs. white sugar.

One-half hour before serving, put in two bottles good champagne—at same time slice thinly one-half dozen lemons and one-half dozen oranges. Let skin of all lemons go in.

Sometimes I add two bottles of Apollinaris at same time the Champagne is put in.

When you do not use it all, skim the lemon peel and bottle it and you can ice and use at another time. It is good to serve at Ladies' Lunch if frozen into an ice.

It will keep good for months in cool place if tightly corked.

# Children's Barn

The Peter White Public Library Children's area lost a friend in 2008. Jerry Timmons of Marquette was quiet man who loved hockey, ski jumping, roller skating and woodworking. This barn, one of his many creations, is on permanent exhibit in the Children's Area of the Peter White Public Library. Barns were his passion and many of his replicas of full size barns were donated to various organizations and charities throughout the community.

Jerry served in the Civilian Conservation Corps at Camp Gibbs from 1938-1939, and in the U.S. Army in the South Pacific during World War II. He was awarded the American Defense Service Ribbon, American Theater Ribbon, Asiatic-Pacific Theater Ribbon with two Bronze Battle Stars, the Philippine Liberation Ribbon with One Bronze Battle Star and five Overseas Service Bars. Jerry was honorably discharged from the army in 1945 after achieving the rank of staff sergeant.

Jerry and his wife Ethel "Esty" raised their children in Howell where he was employed by Michigan Bell Telephone for 36 years as a switchman, then retiring in Marquette.

Jerry Timmons was known as a man who gave more to family and friends than he ever took. He is sorely missed by all who knew him. ~



Claire Rose, deputy director of the Peter White Public Library, Marquette, Mich., has won the second annual Spotlight Award for Public Librarians, sponsored by *BookPage* and recognizing library professionals who "never seek the spotlight but certainly deserve it." Rose was one of 500 librarians nominated for the award and was cited in the nomination for her "passion for her work and a mission to provide for the good of the community" by PWPL patron Theresa Scram. She was also praised for her grant writing ability, including an application for a \$300,000 NEH Challenge Grant that helped the library expand. She has worked for the library 18 years. The award carries a \$2,500 prize for Rose; the library receives \$250.

## A Corner for our Friends

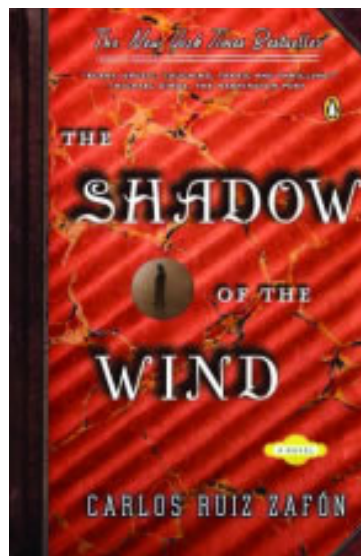

## One Book, One Community

*The Shadow of the Wind*

Barcelona, 1945—just after the war, a great world city lies in shadow, nursing its wounds, and a boy named Daniel awakes on his eleventh birthday to find that he can no longer remember his mother's face. To console his only child, Daniel's widowed father, an antiquarian book dealer, initiates him into the secret of the Cemetery of Forgotten Books, a library tended by Barcelona's guild of rare-book dealers as a repository for books forgotten by the world, waiting for someone who will care about them again.

Daniel's father coaxes him to choose a volume from the spiraling labyrinth of shelves, one that, it is said, will have a special meaning for him. And Daniel so loves the novel he selects, *The Shadow of the Wind* by one Julian Carax, that he sets out to find the rest of Carax's work.

To his shock, he discovers that someone has been systematically destroying every copy of every book this author has written. In fact, he may have the last one in existence. Before Daniel knows it his seemingly innocent quest has opened a door into one of Barcelona's darkest secrets, an epic story of murder, magic, madness and doomed love. And before long he realizes that if he doesn't find out the truth about Julian Carax, he and those closest to him will suffer horribly. (Penguin Books) ~

The *One Book, One Community* program encourages the Marquette County and Northern Michigan University community to read the same book and to come together to discuss it in a variety of settings. Although dozens of similar programs have been sponsored nationwide, this one brings together a county and a university.
